



Disposal of Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Waste

Ah, springtime is in the air. Awakening from our winter rest, what do homeowners start thinking about? Cleaning. And what happens when we clean under the sink, in the basement and in the garage? Like many of us, you may find items that make you wonder if it's safe to throw it in the trash.

How can you tell if something is Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)?

Products around the home that contain chemicals that are toxic, flammable, corrosive or reactive are hazardous household products. These products are safe when used and stored following label direction. However, when the products become unusable and are no longer wanted, they become household hazardous waste. Questionable or obviously hazardous materials should not be dumped into sewer drains, poured into sinks or even thrown into the trash. There is a better way to tidy up your home – and the environment.

In April 2013, St. Louis County opened its first permanent household hazardous waste collection facility. The Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District is proud to have the new collection site on the grounds of the Lemay Wastewater Treatment Facility at 291 E. Hoffmeister Avenue. The new facility is a regional collection point, available to residents of St. Louis County, Jefferson County and the City of St. Louis.

The program is for residential households only. Commercial entities and businesses are not permitted to dispose of hazardous wastes at these facilities.

For electronics recycling events (e.g., old computers, monitors, TVs, consumer electronics, etc.), St. Louis County municipalities regularly hold electronics recycling events (usually held on a Saturday morning, every month) that are open to the public. There may be a nominal charge for certain items but most things can generally be recycled free of charge.
